1. Admission Policy

Kanazawa University Admission Policy

(1) Kanazawa University Charter and Educational Philosophy

Kanazawa University's origins can be traced back to 1862, when the Hikoso Vaccination Center was founded in Kaga Domain. In 1949, various predecessor schools including the former Fourth Higher School were integrated to form Kanazawa University.

Kanazawa University has now clarified its vision in the Kanazawa University Charter as an institution with more than 150 years of education, research and social contributions. This Kanazawa University Charter starts by declaring the path along which the university as a whole should progress.

"Kanazawa University has the goal of becoming "a research university dedicated to education, while opening up its doors to both local and global society." With this objective, the university will work on reform, in the belief that its activities will contribute to the opening up of a new 21st century era, the promotion of world peace and the sustainable development of humankind. Kanazawa University hereby establishes its charter based on the above ideology and objectives."

The educational philosophy stated in this charter can be summed up as follows.

"Kanazawa University shall respect the individuality of students as well as their right to learn, positioning self-study as the basis of education. The university will enhance organized faculty development activities geared towards educational reform in order to foster the ability to acquire specialized knowledge and the ability to pursue problems. Furthermore, the university will cultivate human resources who are adaptable to international society, of high moral character, and rich in humanity."

(2) The Kanazawa University "Global" Standard (KUGS) and Desired Human Resources

In order to give more concrete shape to the University Charter as a human resources development policy suited to the current situation, which calls for the further internationalization of education and the development of global human resources, Kanazawa University has established the Kanazawa University "Global" Standard. This is the university's overall entire admission policy, and the source of the admission policy of each faculty and learning area.

Excerpt from the Kanazawa University "Global" Standard (KUGS)

"Kanazawa University fosters human resources as individuals with the ability, physical stamina and character to become core leaders in a knowledge-based society and address difficulties in their workplaces fearlessly, fulfilling the personal missions of their positions in global society positively as members of the human race."

In other words, Kanazawa University admits students who not only show the qualities and abilities mentioned in the KUGS as certain potential at least, but also have the strong will and aspiration to become this kind of human resource.

These individuals will draw on diverse knowledge in the humanities, social sciences, and natural sciences, to pioneer future science by leveraging the advanced integration of the virtual and the real, with a view toward the realization of sustainable smart cities.

Desired Applicants

The School of Smart Technology and Innovation seeks applicants with the following ambitions.

- Those who wish to study a variety of fields and then integrate the knowledge to take the initiative in identifying and solving issues.
- Those who are intellectually enthusiastic about a variety of systems and customs, and who wish to contribute to building a better society.
- Those who wish to join and integrate the latest knowledge and take on the challenge of the creation of new science to contribute to the future.

Basic Policy for Selection / Common to College of Transdisciplinary Sciences for Innovation

The applicant's motivation to study after admission to Kanazawa University and the suitability of the applicant for the Schools is evaluated holistically through an oral examination (including a presentation) with multi-faceted questions.

Subjects to Be Studied Prior to Admission (Applicable to All Schools in the College of Transdisciplinary Sciences for Innovation)

Students are required to enhance their academic proficiency by taking a balanced approach to studying a wide range of subjects in both the humanities and sciences.

«College of Human and Social Sciences»

School of Humanities

The School of Humanities develops students with the ability to engage in discussion and in-depth study of humanities subjects from a variety of perspectives such as behavior, thought, history, culture, language, and literature. Its aim is to cultivate humanistic and socially aware individuals with problem-identification skills, specialist knowledge with social applicability, a capacity for clear self-expression, a multifaceted outlook, and a flexible communication style.

Desired Applicants

The School of Humanities seeks applicants with the following ambitions.

- Those who are deeply interested in human intellectual activities in relation to behavior, thought, history, culture, language, and

literature, and achievements arising out of such activities, as well as the motivation to pursue higher learning, backed by a diligent and persistent mindset.

- Those who are willing to acquire a suite of humanities-specific research methodologies, including philological considerations, empirical procedures, and fieldwork approaches, and to apply the results of such learning toward solving many different types of issues facing present-day society.
- Those with a broad outlook and open-minded attitude with a view to understanding a diversity of values, traditions, and cultures.
- Those who have comprehensively acquired basic academic skills on subjects taught at senior high school or equivalent educational institutions, specifically the native (Japanese) language, geography, history, civics, mathematics, science, and foreign language studies.
- Those who have adequate linguistic competence for reading comprehension, reasoning, and expressiveness in the native language and in English or other foreign languages.

Basic Policy for Selection / School of Humanities

Evaluations will be made by conducting oral examinations as well as using scores in the Examination for Japanese University (EJU) and external English proficiency tests, and in terms of academic knowledge, expressiveness, learning motivation, and other qualities needed for studying at the University.

Subjects to Be Studied Prior to Admission (Applicable to All Schools in the School of Humanities)

The subjects explored by the School of Humanities cover a broad range of human phenomena, so applicants are expected to have acquired basic knowledge in all major subjects taught at senior high school or equivalent educational institutions as well as having adequate comprehension and thinking skills.

School of Law

In this present age in which societal conditions are changing in big ways on both the domestic and international front, knowledge and understanding of the basic principles of law and politics is essential for individuals to live in harmony. Based on this recognition, the School of Law instructs its students in the systematic study of law and politics, with the objective of fostering graduates who are able to identify various types of issues faced by present-day society and to work on solving related future issues.

Desired Applicants

The School of Law seeks applicants with the following ambitions.

- Those who have the basic knowledge needed to study law and politics at the University.
- Those who are concerned about national and international societal issues and wish to contribute to creating a better society.
- Those who are eager to explore the essential nature of societal phenomena by exercising logical thinking and information analysis skills while also looking at historical backgrounds.

Basic Policy for Selection / School of Law

Evaluations will be made not only based on English language proficiency but also through oral examinations to be conducted in Japanese or English, principally in terms of basic knowledge needed to study law and politics at the University, communication skills for understanding the thinking of others and logical self-expression, and interest in day-to-day societal issues. These will be evaluated in a comprehensive manner.

Subjects to Be Studied Prior to Admission (Applicable to All Schools in the School of Law)

- Understanding of the content of various subjects learned at senior high school or equivalent educational institutions.
- Adequate native language proficiency to comprehend legal text and judicial documents including written precedents, understand political issues, and express one's own opinions in speech and in writing based on information gained through such activities.
- Adequacy in academic skills in social studies and foreign languages needed to explore the essential nature of various sorts of societal and international issues and offer solutions to specific issues.
- Adequacy in mathematics skills needed to perform numerical analysis and in the reasoning process regarding societal issues.

School of Economics

The School of Economics aims to foster graduates capable of addressing a diverse array of societal challenges. For this purpose, the School runs a number of admission programs, in addition to general selection, namely: KUGS Special Entrance Examination (for high school or equivalent graduates who have completed specialized education courses); Chozen Special Entrance Examination; Special Entrance Examination for Returnee Students; International Baccalaureate Entrance Examination; and Special Admission for Self-funded International Students. We seek applicants with a strong interest in the field of economics, strong motivation to study, and excellent basic qualities.

Desired Applicants

The School of Economics seeks applicants with the following ambitions.

- Those who are keen to acquire a systematic body of knowledge on economics and business administration, and to address various societal issues analytically while seeking to offer solutions.
- Those who wish to acquire specialized knowledge in order to work on behalf of the country and/or regional communities.
- Those with a keen interest in day-to-day events occurring in the international socio-economic context.
- Those who are interested in profit and non-profit businesses and who aim to develop careers in these fields.

Basic Policy for Selection / School of Economics

Evaluations will be made with an emphasis on a number of items, such as: knowledge related to present-day culture, society, and economics; reasoning and expressiveness; basic academic knowledge at levels needed for meaningful participation in courses offered by the

school, and post-enrollment plans.

Subjects to Be Studied Prior to Admission (Applicable to All Schools in the School of Economics)

In order to build a professional career, whether in a local or international context, native language as well as English language proficiency and basic information-processing skills are essential. In addition, students at the School of Economics are required to take courses that assume prior mathematical knowledge. Furthermore, in order to understand the modern-day economy and Japan's position in it, applicants should have basic knowledge of geography, history, and civics. To study present-day issues associated with the environment and technological innovation, it is also desirable that applicants have studied and acquired knowledge in the fields of science and technology.

School of Regional Development Studies

The purpose of the School of Regional Development Studies is to develop professional capabilities for promoting regional development, specifically by building skills to analyze and understand the characteristics of a region's natural environment, culture, living environment, human resources, industries, social relations, and other elements, and to engage in planning, design, and policymaking tasks in order to create regional communities characterized by sustainable and high-quality uniqueness in a region-specific autonomous manner.

Each student selects an area of specialization by the end of their second year, chiefly based on their research interests, future career aspirations, and academic performance.

Desired Applicants

The School of Regional Development Studies seeks applicants with the following ambitions.

- Those who have the basic academic skills needed to take courses for regional development studies at the University.
- Those who are willing to make substantial efforts to complete their courses by engaging diligently in the study of relevant literature, essay writing, field trips, and other activities.
- Those who have aspirations to contribute to creating regional communities in which all members enjoy fulfillment and peace of mind and to developing a globally inclusive society.
- Those who are willing and able to proactively access information from international sources.

Basic Policy for Selection / School of Regional Development Studies

Basic academic skills will be evaluated based on scores in the Examination for Japanese University (EJU) and TOEFL iBT, while letters of recommendation as well as the statement of purpose will be used for reference. In the oral examinations, applicants will be asked a number of questions on issues related to regional development from different perspectives for comprehensive evaluation of their basic academic knowledge, reasoning and expressiveness, motivation to study, and other matters.

Subjects to Be Studied Prior to Admission (Applicable to All Schools in the School of Regional Development Studies)

The School of Regional Development Studies seeks applicants

with an overall understanding of both humanities and science subjects taught at senior high school or equivalent educational institutions, which is essential for engaging in regional development studies in a simultaneously specialized and comprehensive way.

Also, as a precondition for developing the skills needed to perform research, analysis, and policymaking tasks in order to address various regional issues, applicants are expected to take a strong interest in themes related to regional communities and be able to independently gather information and organize their thoughts.

School of International Studies

At the School of International Studies, we aim to develop our students' intellectual ability and empathy, both of which are required to navigate a multi-ethnic, multi-religious, and multi-cultural society, the foreign language skills necessary for communication in an international setting, and develop the ability to identify specific problems and propose solutions. Our students are expected to utilize their English and foreign language skills to engage in international exchange activities in Japan and to pursue careers in such fields as government agencies in foreign affairs, foreign aid organizations, international organizations, NPOs, NGOs operating overseas, multinational corporations, and Japanese language education and education relating to Japanese current affairs.

The School of International Studies offers several programs within the following three domains: International Relations and International Cooperation, Area Studies, and Inclusion Studies. Some of these programs are conducted in English.

Desired Applicants

The School of International Studies seeks applicants with the following ambitions.

- Those who are keenly interested in the various issues facing our multi-cultural, multi-ethnic, and globalized world.
- Those who are inquisitive enough to question the identity of their own culture.
- Those who spare no effort in improving their practical foreign language skills—particularly English—which are essential in international settings.
- Those who possess inquiring minds and the communication skills necessary to persevere in dialogue to reach mutual understanding and agreement on various issues that arise in international settings.
- Those who aim to engage in international activities in the future.
- Those who want to teach Japanese language to foreigners.

Basic Policy for Selection / School of International Studies

The oral examination assesses whether applicants possess sufficient foundational knowledge, communication skills (in Japanese or English), and academic motivation. This assessment is combined with EJU scores and scores from designated English proficiency tests for a comprehensive evaluation.

Subjects to Be Studied Prior to Admission (Applicable to All Schools in the School of International Studies)

In the School of International Studies, we aim to cultivate truly global individuals who can understand a globalizing world from diverse

perspectives and can bring about harmonious and flexible coexistence with other cultures. That is why we would like students to proactively study and gain knowledge in subjects such as English, Politics, Economics, World History, and Geography prior to admission. Also, as we will address various issues related to Japan, we also recommend that students study Japanese and Japanese History.

«College of Science and Engineering»

School of Mathematics and Physics

Mathematics and physics represent long-established academic disciplines and are known for their mutually influential development. The new research approach enabled by adopting computational simulation technology has brought about a giant leap in research efforts to decipher complicated mathematical problems and natural phenomena that previously posed unconquerable challenges. Such achievements have provided building blocks to support present-day endeavors in all fields of natural and other sciences. The purpose of the School of Mathematics and Physics is to develop graduates able to engage in a new breed of mathematical and physical research representing a key scientific advancement of the 21st century, with the objective of contributing to the development of the global community. More specifically, we aim to foster individuals able to develop mathematical or physical ways of viewing, thinking, and understanding, and to play an active role in the high-information society, which spans many fields such as education, information and communications, manufacturing, development, and finance.

Desired Applicants

The School of Mathematics and Physics seeks applicants with the following ambitions.

- Those who are interested in mathematics and physics and are eager to study these fields with a keen sense of inquiry.
- Those who are interested in computational simulation and in scientific research that applies such technology.
- Those who aspire to develop a career, as a researcher or educator, in the field of mathematics, applied mathematics, computational science, physics, or related areas.
- Those who are planning to pursue basic science in an in-depth manner with the aim of contributing to the development of the global community.

Basic Policy for Selection / School of Mathematics and Physics

Evaluations will be made with an emphasis on academic competence in mathematics and physics, essential subjects of the School of Mathematics and Physics, as well as English language proficiency, in addition to general basic academic skills, while oral examinations will also be conducted to comprehensively evaluate communication skills in Japanese or English, motivation to study, and personal qualities.

Subjects to Be Studied Prior to Admission (Applicable to All Schools in the School of Mathematics and Physics)

Applicants are expected to have prior learning in eight subject areas across six fields of study (mathematics, science, foreign language, Japanese language, geography/history/civics, information) according to the standard curriculum of Japanese senior high school education or

equivalent subject areas, and to have mastered the content effectively.

School of Chemistry

Chemistry studies cover broad-ranging academic and industrial fields related to the following: clarification of fundamental principles governing the chemical properties, structures, and reactions of matter; creation of new functional materials; development and manufacturing of chemical products for consumer use; and implementation of sustainable energy and environmental technologies. The School of Chemistry operates a program-based curriculum designed to develop excellent researchers and engineers who have technical and inventive abilities to solve various challenges facing today's society. According to this curriculum, students first learn basic skills in core programs, and then choose more than one from among the six thematically organized advanced programs aimed at building skills for taking on challenges to explore fundamental principles of chemistry and create applied technologies.

We seek applicants characterized by unique and creative ways of seeing and thinking as well as a strong sense of inquiry, appetite for new challenges and readiness to explore the unknown.

Desired Applicants

The School of Chemistry seeks applicants with the following ambitions.

- Those who are strongly interested in observation and experimentation concerning natural phenomena and eager to engage with nature through creative experimentation activities.
- Those who have a distinctive creative thinking ability and curiosity about nature and are motivated by the thrill of new discovery.
- Those who are keen to communicate research results to the world and to apply achievements to address societal and environmental issues.

Basic Policy for Selection / School of Chemistry

Evaluations will be made with an emphasis on academic competence in chemistry and mathematics, while oral examinations will also be conducted to evaluate basic knowledge needed for meaningful participation in courses offered by the school, communication skills in Japanese or English, motivation to pursue chemistry studies, and personal qualities.

Subjects to Be Studied Prior to Admission (Applicable to All Schools in the School of Chemistry)

Applicants are expected to have a good understanding of subjects studied at senior high school or equivalent educational institutions (prerequisite subjects for the Common Test for University Admissions). In particular, math and science subjects, including chemistry, are essential as a basis for science and engineering studies. Humanities subjects (native [Japanese] language, foreign language, social studies [geography, history, civics]) are also important for the purpose of developing skills for formulating and expressing opinions and engaging in effective communication. Applicants are also advised to cultivate curiosity about various scientific phenomena, including those found in everyday life, and to develop an investigatory mindset regarding such events.

School of Mechanical Engineering

The purpose of the School of Mechanical Engineering is to develop researchers and engineers able to engage in studies related to advanced design technology, ultra-high precision machining, and high-level simulation techniques to be applied in the development of a variety of industrial products intended to support safety and security and improve living standards. Such individuals are also expected to engage in cutting-edge technological development, including for solutions to energy issues, and to serve as future manufacturing professionals who will play leadership roles in various international contexts. To the above end, the School organizes its curriculum by adopting a substantial number of math and physics subjects to build a foundation for the study of mechanical engineering, with the objective of cultivating application capabilities that are supported by solid basic skills and are able to be enhanced through advanced education and research programs offered with a view to promoting the creation of technological innovations. At the same time, our curriculum also contains educational and research programs related to ethics and the environment as part of character-building efforts aimed at contributing to social harmony.

The School seeks applicants who are interested in utilizing mathematical and physical capabilities for handling matter of all sizes ranging from the atomic and molecular levels to huge structures in order to address a wide range of engineering themes by taking on challenges to explore unknown frontiers, centering on optimal design methods, ultra-high precision machining, and new materials development, as well as engaging in areas contributing to the protection and conservation of the natural environment, such as the development of environmentally friendly new energy and engine systems.

Desired Applicants

The School of Mechanical Engineering seeks applicants with the following ambitions.

- Those who have an interest in advanced mechanical engineering studies, a passion for manufacturing, a strong desire to help people, and an eagerness to actively engage in research activities through attending lectures, experiments, and practical sessions.
- Those who are aware of technical ethics, concerned about the global environment, and motivated to take on a global perspective and improve their international communication skills.
- Those who are rich in originality and creativity and motivated to solve problems on their own initiative.

Basic Policy for Selection / School of Mechanical Engineering

Evaluations will be made regarding academic skills in basic science subjects—namely, mathematics, physics, and chemistry—as well as English language proficiency, while oral examinations will also be conducted to evaluate communication skills in Japanese or English, motivation to pursue engineering studies, and personal qualities.

Subjects to Be Studied Prior to Admission (Applicable to All Schools in the School of Mechanical Engineering)

Applicants are expected to have a good understanding of prerequisite subjects (humanities and science) for the Common Test for University Admissions as well as subjects (mathematics, science,

English language) specified for taking the examinations administered by the University for general selection. Applicants are also advised to develop an inquiring mind by seeking to understand events taking place in daily life, particularly those related to manufacturing systems and common scientific phenomena.

School of Frontier Engineering

Our school aims to educate engineers and researchers who will advance engineering and create near-future societies from a global perspective. Through our cutting-edge educational programs and research initiatives, which integrate knowledge and technologies from mechanical engineering, chemical engineering, and electronic information engineering, we seek to open new frontiers ranging from the nanoscale structures to outer space and human society. We welcome students with interests ranging from advanced fields expected to bring about technological revolutions, such as robotics, aerospace engineering, advanced sensing technologies, nanotechnology, and novel functional materials, to areas supporting the harmony and development of society and daily life, including biomedical and welfare engineering, assistive devices, and chemical products. Rather than adopting a course system, our school offers a flexible curriculum combining three Core Programs (Information Mechatronics, Human Mechanics, and Materials) with three Fundamental Frontier Programs (Intelligent Machinery, Human Mechatronics, and Materials Design) and two Supplementary Frontier Programs (Advanced Interdisciplinary Studies and Advanced Physical Measurement).

Desired Applicants

The School of Frontier Engineering seeks applicants with the following ambitions.

- Individuals eager to pioneer new technologies and academic disciplines in fields such as robotics, aerospace engineering, smart vehicles, smart sensing, intelligent control, nanoscale measurement, polymers, and particulate materials.
- Individuals aspiring to build careers as engineers, researchers, or educators in mechanical engineering, electronic information engineering, and chemical engineering, with particular focus on mechatronics, biomedical and welfare engineering, and materials systems.
- Individuals with strong aspirations to advance technological innovation from a global perspective, with the aim of creating technologies that will shape the society for future generations.
- Those who are rich in humanity, originality, and creativity and are motivated to solve problems on their own initiative.
- Individuals who demonstrate humanity, originality, and creativity, and who are motivated to identify and solve problems independently.

Basic Policy for Selection / School of Frontier Engineering

Evaluation will place emphasis on academic competence in fundamental science subjects - namely mathematics, physics, and chemistry - as well as proficiency in the English language. Oral examinations will also be conducted to assess communication skills in Japanese or English, motivation for pursuing engineering studies, and personal qualities.

Subjects to Be Studied Prior to Admission (Applicable to All Schools in the School of Frontier Engineering)

Applicants are expected to have a solid understanding of prerequisite subjects (both in the humanities and sciences) required for the Common Test for University Admissions, as well as subjects (mathematics, science, and English) designated for the University's general selection examinations. In addition, we seek applicants who demonstrate broad intellectual curiosity about everyday life, particularly regarding manufacturing and product-related systems, as well as common scientific phenomena.

School of Electrical, Information and Communication Engineering

Our school specializes in two major disciplines—electrical and electronic technology (EET) and information and communication technology (ICT)—and aims to promote the creation of a highly information-oriented society that can develop sustainably. We seek applicants who are interested in science and technology related to electrical energy generation and conversion, nanotechnology, optical and electronic devices, space exploration, security, artificial intelligence, Internet of Things (IoT), big data, cloud computing, and others.

The School offers two major courses for EET and ICT. Our curriculum is designed to develop engineers and researchers who have a global perspective, high level of professional ethics, and self-reliant mindset while also being capable of finding solutions to future challenges in the field of EET and ICT.

Desired Applicants

The School of Electrical, Information and Communication Engineering seeks applicants with the following ambitions.

- Those who wish to master specialist skills in energy, electronics, and information and communication technology and play an active role by using such skills for various purposes in national and international contexts.
- Those who are interested in scientific experiments and computer sciences, and aspire to work in the fields of EET and ICT, engaging in inventive activities to embrace future challenges and find solutions.
- Those who are particularly strong at mathematics and eager to work on applied physics and mathematics.

Basic Policy for Selection / School of Electrical, Information and Communication Engineering

Evaluations will be made with an emphasis on academic competence in basic science subjects—namely, mathematics, physics, and chemistry—as well as English language proficiency, while oral examinations will also be conducted to evaluate communication skills in Japanese or English, motivation to pursue engineering studies, and personal qualities.

Subjects to Be Studied Prior to Admission (Applicable to All Schools in the School of Electrical, Information and Communication Engineering)

The School seeks applicants who have a full understanding of both humanities and science subjects that are prerequisites for the Common Test for University Admissions. Applicants are also expected to have

strong learning and a solid understanding of the subjects (mathematics, physics, English language) specified for taking the examinations administered by the University for general selection. This is vitally important as it forms an essential foundation for learning and studying effectively in the courses offered by the School.

School of Geosciences and Civil Engineering

Our school has established a common education framework based on the Kanazawa University Global Standard (KUGS) for developing graduates able to play a leadership role in supporting a global society. In the framework, a suite of programs are organized centering on three fundamental themes: earth, the foundation of human existence; society, the foundation of people's lives; and the environment that encompasses these two elements. The programs are designed to develop in students the ability to think flexibly both from science and engineering perspectives by taking two different approaches—an extensive and overall understanding of the basics as well as comprehensive and practical education and research activities based on specialized knowledge—drawing on a body of expertise from a range of disciplines across geosciences, environmental sciences, environmental engineering, civil engineering, disaster prevention engineering, and urban engineering. By running these programs, we aim to develop researchers, engineers, and educators able to play leadership roles in responding to various societal situations in both regional and global contexts. We seek applicants who have strong scientific curiosity and are eager to study these disciplines with the aim of building a specialist career in related fields. The School offers three major courses: geoscience, civil engineering and disaster prevention, and environmental urban engineering. Each student selects one course before the start of the second semester in their second year, with the determination made based primarily on preference and academic performance.

Desired Applicants

The School of Geosciences and Civil Engineering seeks applicants with the following ambitions.

- Those possessing scientific curiosity with regard to natural phenomena.
- Those who are characterized primarily by a scientific frame of mind while also taking an interest in humanities and social science.
- Those who are interested in conducting experiments and field research and engaging in manufacturing and creative work.
- Those who are concerned about natural disasters and disaster prevention and mitigation efforts on a regional, national, or global scale.
- Those who aspire to build a career as a specialist or researcher in the geosciences, environmental sciences, or social infrastructure engineering.
- Those who aspire to contribute to society by working within the fields of science and technology to address various global, environmental, and urban issues.
- Those who are interested in making scientific and technological efforts to support urban and public infrastructure.

Basic Policy for Selection / School of Geosciences and Civil Engineering

Evaluations will be made with an emphasis on academic competence in basic science subjects—namely, mathematics, physics, and chemistry—as well as English reading and listening skills, while oral examinations will also be conducted to evaluate basic knowledge needed for meaningful participation in courses offered by the School, communication skills in Japanese or English, motivation to pursue science and engineering studies, and personal qualities.

Subjects to Be Studied Prior to Admission (Applicable to All Schools in the School of Geosciences and Civil Engineering)

Applicants are expected to have a solid understanding of subjects studied at senior high school or equivalent educational institutions (including prerequisites for the Common Test for University Admissions). Applicants are particularly expected to have a good understanding, and relevant application abilities, of mathematics and science subjects as well as the English language. We also recommend that applicants study not only science-related subjects but also those related to humanities, social studies, and information in order to acquire comprehensive academic skills.

School of Biological Science and Technology

It is generally accepted that “life” is one of the most important key terms of the 21st century, and biological science is making rapid progress to clarify the systems of many species of living organisms and the mechanisms of their vital processes. Our school aims to foster graduates able to engage in this field in two professional categories. The first is researchers and engineers able to play a leading role in promoting life science research efforts in a global society, centering on the three disciplines of biological science (for seeking after the truth about life phenomena); bioengineering (for industrial applications and technological development); and bioinformatics (for facilitating computer-driven expansion and acceleration of these activities). The second professional category is as educators able to contribute to developing professionals with advanced knowledge in the life sciences. The School seeks applicants who have a strong passion for academic pursuits aimed at opening up new frontiers, and academic aspirations for building careers as specialists in science and engineering.

Our curriculum offers three major courses covering bioscience, living marine resources, and bioengineering. Each student selects one course before the start of the second semester in their second year, with the determination made based primarily on preference and academic performance.

Desired Applicants

The School of Biological Science and Technology seeks applicants with the following ambitions.

- Those who are interested in the science of life phenomena and have strengths in science-related subjects, and who enjoy conducting experiments and field research.
- Those who are concerned about issues associated with the sustainable and effective use of living marine resources and aquaculture and stock enhancement.
- Those who aspire to build careers as a specialist or educator in the

fields of basic biology, molecular biology, evolutionary biology, bionomics, systems biology, genetic engineering, bioengineering, biorefinery, bioinformatics, environmental science, biology of diversity, biological oceanography, conservation biology, and other related disciplines.

- Those who wish to pursue the creation of new value and technological innovation in the field of life sciences and bioengineering.
- Those who aspire to play a leadership role in contributing to sectors related to life sciences, bioscience, marine resources, and environmental sciences in a global society by utilizing basic knowledge of science and engineering.

Basic Policy for Selection / School of Biological Science and Technology

Evaluations will be made of academic competence in mathematics, science, and the English language. Oral examinations will be conducted to evaluate basic knowledge, motivation to study, and communication skills, principally to confirm levels needed for meaningful participation in courses offered by the School.

Subjects to Be Studied Prior to Admission (Applicable to All Schools in the School of Biological Science and Technology)

Applicants are expected to have a solid understanding of subjects studied at senior high school or equivalent educational institutions (including prerequisites for the Common Test for University Admissions). It is especially important to have a full understanding, and relevant application abilities, of mathematics and science subjects essential to studying life sciences, as well as the English language. Applicants are also advised to cultivate an extensive interest in studying natural science in general.

2. Outline of Special Admission for Self-funded International Students

In order to reduce the burden of entrance exams for highly motivated applicants who do not hold Japanese nationality, our university has established the “Special Admission for Self-funded International Students” which exempts them from taking the Common University Entrance Test.

The qualities, motivation, aptitude, etc. required by each school will be evaluated comprehensively and from various angles through an oral examination.

[Pre-arrival Admission]

The University operates the “Pre-arrival Admission” (to enable applicants living overseas to complete the entire admission process, which ranges from submission and acceptance of application documents, participation in admission examinations and receiving of relevant results to enrollment, from outside Japan and in person).

This is to eliminate the need for applicants living outside Japan to travel to Japan, particularly for the purpose of taking admission examinations. Instead, applicants are required to take the Examination for Japanese University (EJU) administered by the Japan Student Services Organization outside Japan, in addition to participating in admission examinations administered by the University by selecting the online oral examination option. **Requests to take the online oral examination** can be submitted during the Application Period to the Entrance Exam Section, Admission Division, Educational and Student Affairs Department (see “15. Inquiries” on page 23). The applicant will receive detailed information from the Section at least two weeks prior to the day of the examination. If the above-described date passes without a relevant response received, the applicant is asked to contact the Section. by Email.

However, applicants to the School of Teacher Education, College of Human and Social Sciences and all Schools College of Medical, Pharmaceutical and Health Sciences must travel to Japan to take the tests at Kanazawa University. Applicants to these schools cannot use the “Pre-arrival Admission”.

Individuals who do not have Japanese nationality (excluding those who have obtained permanent residence in Japan) and satisfy conditions (1) and (2) below

(1) Applicants meeting any of the following conditions:

- ① Completion or expected completion of a 12-year course in school education overseas by March 2026, or completion of an equivalent qualification designated by the Minister of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology;
- ② Receipt of an International Baccalaureate Diploma from the International Baccalaureate Office, a foundation based on the Swiss Civil Code;
- ③ Acquisition of the Abitur qualification, which is recognized as a university entrance qualification in each state of the Federal Republic of Germany;
- ④ Acquisition of the Baccalaureate qualification, which is recognized as a university entrance qualification in the French Republic;
- ⑤ Acquisition of General Certificate of Education Advanced Level (GCE A-Level) qualifications, recognized as university admission qualifications in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland or Acquisition of International General Certificate of Education Advanced Level (International A-Level) qualifications (however, this is limited to people who have passed at least three subjects (grade of at least E))
- ⑥ Acquisition of the European Baccalaureate qualification, which is recognized as a university entrance qualification in the member countries of the European Union.

⑦ Completion or expected completion of a 12-year course by March 2026 at an overseas educational facility accredited by international evaluation organizations (Western Association of Schools and Colleges, Association of Christian Schools International or Council of International Schools).

(2) Undertaking of the EJU in the academic year 2024 or 2025, conducted by the Independent Administrative Institution Japan Student Services Organization.

< Notes >

After admission, students need to obtain a status of residence (in principle “student”) as set out in Appended Table I of the Immigration Control and Refugee Recognition Act. Students can be admitted for study at the University with another status of residence allowing a long-term stay in Japan. However, such students are not eligible to apply for the various financial aid for those holding a “student” visa.

In addition, students cannot continue studying at the university with a short-stay visa.

5. Application Conditions

- (1) For School of Mechanical Engineering, School of Frontier Engineering, and School of Electrical, Information and Communication Engineering applicants must take the designated subjects in the Examination for Japanese University (EJU) and score over 60% in each subject, as well as score over 50% in the TOEFL iBT.

■ Warning Regarding Misconduct During the Entrance Exam for Kanazawa University

1. The following acts shall be regarded as misconduct during the entrance exam for the university and shall disqualify the examinee from the entrance exam.

- (1) Having another person take the exam in place of yourself, or taking the exam yourself in place of another person.
- (2) Intentionally inputting or entering false information on the application confirmation slip or answer sheet.
- (3) Opening the question booklet and/or beginning the exam before instructed to begin.
- (4) Cheating (Bringing in a cheat sheet, looking at the contents of books such as textbooks, reference books, dictionaries, and so on, looking at the answers of other examinees, obtaining answers from other person(s), exchanging answers, and so on), helping someone else to cheat, and/or giving answers to other examinees.
- (5) Taking the distributed question booklet, draft paper, and/or answer sheet out of the exam room during the exam period.
- (6) Using items that are not permitted in the **Precautions** When Taking the Entrance Exam during the exam period.
- (7) Using or wearing electronic devices such as mobile phones, smartphones, wearable devices, tablets, electronic dictionaries, IC recorders, earphones/headphones, and/or music players during the exam and/or in the oral exam room before the oral exam begins instead of turning such devices off and storing them inside a bag and so on. Earphones/headphones are assumed to be in use if they are worn in or on the ear.
- (8) Ignoring instructions to put all pencils and erasers down and close the question booklets and continuing to complete your answers instead.
- (9) Obtaining information about the exam from another examinee who has completed the exam before you, and/or giving information about the exam to another examinee who is about to take the exam during the oral exam.

2. In addition to the acts included in 1, above, the following may be regarded as misconduct. Similar to the acts included in 1, above, examinees who fail to follow the instructions and who are found to have committed misconduct will be disqualified from the entrance exam.

- (1) In addition to (7) of 1, above, influencing the progress of the exam by having sounds (ringtones, alarms, vibration noises, and so on) emitted by devices during the exam, having failed to turn off your alarm and/or notification settings.
- (2) Making false allegations or concealing something in order to gain an advantage for yourself or others at the exam site, and/or committing acts that may disturb other examinees or hinder the smooth implementation of the exam at the university.
- (3) Failing to follow the instructions of the proctor and/or faculty members and so on at the exam site.
- (4) Committing other acts that may undermine the impartiality of the exam.

3. If misconduct is discovered, the university may take measures such as filing a criminal complaint with the police.

4. National financial support system

The “National financial support system” (New System) provided by the Japanese government offers two types of assistance: “waivers for admission and tuition fees”, and “grant-type scholarships from the Japan Student Services Organization (JASSO)”. This is a system in which universities reduce or waive admission and tuition fees for students who apply for and are awarded grant-type scholarships from the JASSO.

Students who are eligible for support under the New System receive admission and tuition fee reductions or exemptions, as well as grant-type scholarships, depending on their support category. For households with multiple children, admission and tuition fees are fully waived regardless of the support category. In addition, Kanazawa University has its own admission and tuition fee reduction system for those who are not eligible for the New System.

5. Scholarships

There are two types of scholarships offered by outside organizations that Self-funded international students can also apply for.

7. Compulsory Student Insurance

To cover possible accidents during student life, **Kanazawa University requires students to obtain Personal Accident Insurance for Students Pursuing Education and Research (Gakkensai) and Liability Insurance (Futai Baiseki). International students are required to be covered by the Personal Accident Insurance for Students Pursuing Education and Research (Gakkensai) and the Comprehensive Insurance for Students Lives Coupled with Gakkensai for International Students (Inbound Futai Gakuso).** Both types of insurance are for students of universities and colleges throughout Japan and are provided by Japan Educational Exchanges and Services. Students who do not have insurance may not be allowed to participate in extracurricular activities, educational training, internships, etc. For details on insurance fees and payment methods, please check the admission procedure guidelines.

Gakkensai: In Japan and overseas, this insurance provides coverage against (1) sudden and accidental outpatient injuries that occur during educational and research activities and (2) injuries that occur while commuting or while at institutional facilities.

Futai Baiseki: In Japan and overseas, this insurance provides coverage against legal damages for injuries inflicted on others, property damage, etc., during regular academic operations, academic events, extracurricular activities or travel. Students are required to have both Gakkensai and Futai Baiseki.

International Students are not required to obtain Futai Baiseki, but are required to obtain Inbound Futai Gakuso.

Unlike “extracurricular activities” in Gakkensai, “extracurricular activities” in Futai Baiseki refers to internships or volunteer activities conducted by organizations approved by the university for the purpose of conducting internships or volunteer activities.

■ Student Life / Personal Information

1. Student Dormitory

The university has shared house-type student dormitories, Sakigake and Hokumei, where international and Japanese students live in one unit (separated by gender) for the purpose of promoting international exchange and developing global human resources.

The Dormitories only accept residents when there are vacancies. For details on how to apply, please check the university website.

2. Preparation of a Laptop Computer

Wireless LAN (KAINS-WiFi) is available almost everywhere on our campus, and you can access the network using KAINS-WiFi.

By logging into the university's portal site (Acanthus Portal), students can register for courses, communicate with faculty members in charge of each course, conduct self-study using e-learning materials, submit reports, check grades, and obtain general information about student life, including the results of medical examinations and support for higher education and employment.

In the "Introduction to Data Science" a required course for all students after admission, students learn the basics of these operations and data science using laptop computers in each department.

3. Health Service Center

The Health Service Center has doctors, counselors (certified psychologists and clinical psychologists), nurses, public health nurses, etc., to provide regular physical examinations, health consultations, student consultations, first aid and so forth for improving the physical and mental health of students. 4. Privacy Policy

Kanazawa University is making efforts to appropriately manage and protect personal data owned by the university following the Act on the Protection of Personal Information Held by Incorporated Administrative Agencies, the university's Management Policy, and other rules and regulations.

All personal information acquired by the University after the selection of students for admission, the admission procedure, and after enrollment will be used for the following purposes.

- (1) Tasks related to new student selection or admission procedures
- (2) Tasks related to post-admission registrar management or school instruction and those related to health management, such as medical checkup
- (3) Tasks related to on-campus services, such as the university's portal site, on-campus LAN, library and book lending services after admission
- (4) Tasks related to student support services, such as admission fee exemption, tuition exemption or scholarship recipient selection tasks
- (5) Tasks related to payment of admission fee or tuition, and those necessary for financial institution's receipt and disbursement services on commission
- (6) Investigation and research related to statistical processing and analysis in a form that does not identify individuals for the purpose of contributing to entrance examination reform and educational reform, and presentations at academic conferences, etc.
- (7) Tasks related to public relations targeting students and their families and those related to the university foundation (donations) .
- (8) Tasks related to engaging in outcomes assessment on alumni or providing support to alumni association activities, as well as information services and information provision services through Kanazawa University
- (9) Tasks related to emergency response for the protection of individuals
- (10) Other statistical processing tasks without personal identifiers


